

## Franklin University Graduation Rates

The following information regarding Franklin University's graduation rates is provided in compliance with the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended. The federal government requires institutions of higher education to report to the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) data on first-time, full-time students who begin in the fall term. The IPEDS Six-Year Undergraduate Student Graduation Rates for Fall 2018 Cohort table below reflects full-time, first-time, degree-seeking undergraduates who entered the University in the fall term and graduated within six years of attendance (150% of the normal completion time).

This defined graduation rate does not include part-time students, transfer students, or students who left school to serve in the armed forces. Franklin students balance finishing their degrees with work, family and other competing priorities. Unexpected breaks are sometimes necessary to ultimately achieve academic success. Many Franklin students attend part-time and start their enrollment in terms other than the fall. Additionally, the many of our students transfer credit from other institutions. The Franklin-Defined Six-Year Undergraduate Student Graduation Rates for Fall 2018 Cohort table below reflects the graduation rates for all Franklin undergraduate students who entered the University in the given fall term and graduated within six years of attendance (150% of the normal completion time).
